Protecting 30% of England's land and sea by 2030

Dear Secretary of State,

The Government's commitment to manage 30% of England's land and sea for nature by 2030 is very positive.

Strong and clear criteria for what should be included in 30x30 are essential. If the bar is set too low in order to count existing protected areas, regardless of their condition or effectiveness, then the purpose of 30x30 will be undermined.

Our view is that long-term protection, positive management for nature, and regular monitoring demonstrating good or recovering ecological condition are essential criteria for inclusion in 30x30.

Application of the criteria then points toward the additional regulatory and management activities needed to achieve the target. For example, protected landscapes should not be counted toward 30x30 in their current form because they lack clear plans and purposes for nature recovery, but more of these areas would contribute if Lord John Randall's amendment to the Levelling Up Bill were agreed when the Bill returns to parliament. Similarly, we do not think that SSSIs should be counted if they are in unfavourable condition with no sign of recovery, but an improved system of assessing and monitoring progress toward favourable condition would ensure these areas are contributing to delivery.

Strong criteria would also enable the development of a clear pipeline of potential sites for future inclusion in the target, once they meet the grade, for example through better management and a regular programme of monitoring of Local Wildlife Sites.

Such a robust approach would bring more of England's most important land and sea for nature into long-term effective management and ensure these areas are delivering their potential for biodiversity.

We would like to offer our support in developing the 30x30 criteria, drawing on the land experience and scientific monitoring experience of many of our members.

We hope very much that you will be able to accept our offer of support on the design and delivery of this essential agenda. We would be delighted to discuss this further.
