RE: East Inshore & East Offshore Marine Plan Areas - Draft Statement of Public Participation

Wildlife and Countryside Link (Link) brings together over 30 of the UK's leading voluntary organisations united by their common interest in the conservation and enjoyment of wildlife, the countryside and the marine environment. Taken together our members have the support of over 8 million people in the UK.

Link's Marine Working Group is a long-time supporter of and campaigner for a new strategic, forward-looking marine planning system. We therefore welcome this consultation on the Draft Statement of Public Participation (SPP) for the East Inshore and Offshore Marine Plan Areas. In particular, we support the development of one SPP for both plan areas, and the decision to engage stakeholders and develop the marine plans for both areas simultaneously.

Link would however like to raise a number of concerns with respect to the Draft SPP:

- The SPP refers in various places to balancing the needs of current and future generations, as well as balancing economic, social and environmental needs. Link believes that the SPP needs to better reflect the role and benefits of marine planning as laid out in Defra's 'Marine Planning System for England' July 2010 consultation document. In that document, Defra make it clear that the intention is for the marine plans to <u>integrate</u> environmental, social and economic considerations through the plan-making process rather than <u>balancing</u> them.
- Link notes with concern that environmental NGOs are not mentioned in the list of key stakeholder groups (pg.7-8). We see this as a serious omission. Environmental NGOs have a great deal of information and expertise to bring to the marine planning process, including experience of planning systems on land

In addition, many of the Link member organisations are active at the coast, either in the role of landowner or land manager.

- Overall, the SPP says very little on the environmental and conservation aspects
 of the marine plan areas. Instead, giving the impression that economic needs
 provide the primary rationale for marine planning in these areas. Link is of the
 view that the role of marine planning (as well as being the MMO's duty) is to
 achieve sustainable development in the marine area, which includes ensuring
 that the ability of the marine environment to continue to deliver crucial
 ecosystem goods and services is not compromised.
- Link is of the opinion that more detailed information is needed for the 1 year period of scoping. The lack of any detail over this period does not help stakeholders understand how and when they will be contacted by the MMO, or *vice versa*, or when stakeholder events will take place, etc.
