Dear Secretary of State

We are writing to raise concerns about alleged cuts of up to £200m from Defra's budget. Collectively, Wildlife and Countryside Link's members have the support of approximately 8.4 million people in the UK. We are alarmed that budgets appear to be being cut in such a drastic way, and have written in similar terms to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

We are seriously worried that the budget of Natural England has been cut before the organisation has even been formally established and support the assertion of Sir Martin Doughty, the new Chairman of Natural England, that "the scale of these cuts risks the wheels coming off the organisation even before it reaches October's launchpad". This organisation should be 'delivering more than the sum of its parts' from early on, and these cuts make that far less likely.

The Government has made significant advances towards more environmentally sustainable agriculture support, particularly through the agri-environment schemes. We are troubled by cuts to the funding of these schemes. Adequate funding of the higherlevel Environmental Stewardship scheme is essential if Government commitments to the UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) are to be met, in terms of species and habitats. The scheme is also vital to ensure management and enhancement of traditional agricultural landscapes, their character, and their historic and archaeological features. Furthermore, despite recent progress, the delivery of well established Public Service Agreement targets for farmland birds and Sites of Special Scientific Interest will be jeopardised without adequate levels of funding. It is also the means by which wider public benefits, such as an attractive countryside available to all, can be delivered.

In the run-up to the Comprehensive Spending Review, and in the light of the current stringent financial climate, we urge you to promote increased investment in the environment. Such investment will be essential not only to stay on track to halt biodiversity loss by 2010, but also to continue to reap the considerable rewards of the essential ecosystem services which healthy biodiversity provides. Furthermore, well managed traditional farmed landscapes make a considerable contribution to national

We look to you and your Department to provide leadership across government on this issue, and hope that you will focus on the long-term benefits of investing in a healthy and thriving natural environment for all.
